Our Mission

The mission of the Bell Asteri Foundation is to improve the lives of the children of the cancer community through the art of storytelling.

Our History

Bell Asteri Foundation was established to oversee and fund two imprints: Bell Asteri Publishing and Ashland Ink Publishing. What began as a vision to help end pediatric cancer by giving a voice to children in the cancer community (patients, siblings, and the young children of parents with cancer) took shape in 2021 when Bell Asteri Publishing & Enterprises released its first books. Every project is created by and for the pediatric and adolescent/young adult (AYA) cancer community. As the mission grew, a second imprint was launched to expand into stories reflecting other challenging life circumstances faced by people of all ages.

Building on the success within the pediatric and AYA cancer community, and recognizing the need for greater impact, the team established the Bell Asteri Foundation as a 501(c)3 nonprofit in 2025 to expand support and funding for this vital work.

Our "Why"



Each year in the United States, more than 16,000 children and teenagers are diagnosed with cancer, and around 1,800 lose their lives. Cancer remains the leading cause of death by disease among children (ages 0-14) in our nation. Beyond childhood, another 85,000 adolescents and young adults (AYA) are diagnosed annually. Those in their late teens, 20s, and 30s face unique challenges, different from both pediatric patients and older adults. Tragically, they have seen the least progress in survival rates since the passage of the National Cancer Act of 1971.

Despite this urgent need, funding for pediatric cancer research remains critically low. Federal cancer research funding has seen little growth over the past several decades, and only 8% is dedicated specifically to pediatric cancers. As a result, families must often rely on philanthropy to fuel hope and progress in the fight against these devastating diseases.

The impact on families is overwhelming. Many face crushing financial burdens, with some driven to bankruptcy. Treatment costs are immense, and because most families do not live near a hospital equipped to treat pediatric cancer, they are forced to travel long distances or even relocate. Often, one parent must leave the workforce to care for their child full-time. Siblings face separation, childcare challenges, and emotional strain. Children with cancer and their brothers and sisters alike suffer from serious mental health struggles. And for those who do survive, life after cancer is not the same. Long-term and late effects include organ damage, infertility, and increased risks for secondary cancers.

At the Bell Asteri Foundation, we are deeply committed to walking alongside these families. Supporting them is our mission and our passion. We also stand with the many bereaved families who long to keep their child's memory alive, offering creative avenues for healing and remembrance through books, film, music, and art.

Pillars of Support



Our work is built on four main pillars of support, each designed to increase awareness and funding for pediatric and AYA cancers. These pillars focus on advancing research; developing better therapies and technologies to treat and cure these diseases; and on funding programs such as mental health retreats, family camps, and legislative advocacy to support patients and their families.

PUBLISHING





All books and materials published under the Bell Asteri Publishing imprint are carefully reviewed by our Board of Directors to ensure they reflect our mission. Our authors include childhood cancer patients and survivors, siblings of children with cancer, and parents who have shared that journey. Some contributors also come from the AYA cancer community or are family members of those affected.

The Ashland Ink Publishing imprint highlights works created by and for older cancer patients, as well as children facing other life-threatening illnesses. We also publish books that inspire young people to "rise above the ashes" of trauma or hardship, offering encouragement and hope through their stories.

Beyond publishing, we produce the *Threads of Gold* podcast, available on YouTube and all major platforms, along with book trailers, author events, and original music inspired by our characters. We are currently expanding our mission to include documentary-style films that share the real stories of families affected by childhood cancer.



The Bell Asteri Publishing imprint is dedicated to publishing books, videos, music, and projects that put a spotlight on childhood and AYA cancers. All of the authors and contributors have a connection to pediatric/AYA cancer.

RESOURCES





Ashland Academy serves as the educational outreach branch of Bell Asteri Publishing. Through both the Bell Asteri and Ashland imprints, we provide resources for teachers, students, parents, hospitals, libraries, and other institutions. Our materials cover a wide range of topics, from helping children and adults better understand cancer to exploring themes such as courage and kindness through our characters, to supporting literacy development in both English and Spanish.

Ashland Academy offers discounted book bundles for K–12 educators, along with free downloadable lesson plans, graphic organizers, exam questions, and other classroom tools. We also provide book donations to homebound or hospitalized patients.

Looking ahead, our long-term goal is to expand these efforts by increasing the number of books and resources we can donate to hospitals, libraries, school counselors, therapists, and others who support children and families in medically vulnerable circumstances.

SCHOLARSHIPS





The Bell Asteri Foundation is dedicated to supporting young people in the cancer community through scholarships that extend beyond traditional college funding. These awards may be applied toward university or community college, trade schools, or study-abroad opportunities. Eligible applicants include childhood cancer survivors, siblings of children with cancer, and children of AYA cancer patients.

Applicants will be asked to provide a statement of financial need and a short essay reflecting on how cancer has shaped their lives. At launch, scholarships will begin at \$500, with the goal of increasing to \$1,000 or more as the program grows. We recognize that young people affected by cancer face unique challenges, and helping them move forward is one of our highest priorities. Access to education, whether through a four-year university, community college, or trade program, can provide the foundation to rebuild, thrive, and pursue their goals.

Beyond academic scholarships, the Foundation also plans to offer grants for authors and their families to participate in advocacy events. These include Cancer Action Days in Washington, D.C., in February, and CureFest for Childhood Cancer each September. CureFest unites the cancer community for a weekend of events, including the Childhood Cancer Summit hosted by the Congressional Childhood Cancer Caucus, the Golden Toast, and the Rally to the Capitol.




